CITY COUNCIL NEWS

The Mondamin City Council met on March 2, 2026, at 7:00 p.m. in the city hall. Routine opening business was conducted. Under Public Comments Clerk Hirst mentions that she has received several complaints from residents about feral cats. She reported that she has contacted the Harrison County Human Society and they said they are waiting until the new vet clinic in Woodbine open in April to resume trapping.

The community center manager submitted her report. Several new items have been ordered from the King grant which was received last winter. The library report will be submitted next month and there was no report from the fire department. The council did comment on the passing of Norman Wallis. Norm was an amazing volunteer and friend to the Mondamin community. He will be deeply missed.

John Harrison was available by phone to inform the council of the guidelines in the teardown process of 409 Pine Street.

A building permit was approved for the corner of Maple and S. County Drive. Mondamin Community Partners and the Mondamin Community Center's board will be collaborating on the festivities for Heritage Day.

The Council discussed the rising costs of wastewater and water testing. Mike was asked to look into what other towns that don't use People Service to see how they handle sample submission.

The Council approved the continuation of printing the Mondamin Newsletter. The cost for this printing runs between \$21 and \$25 each month.

The Council approved hiring contract laborer Brad Hopkins as a substitute when Mike Kelley has to be away. They agreed on \$25 per hour with a two-hour minimum when he is needed.

More discussion was held on the street repairs. Mike will put together a bid pack and contact companies interested in the projects.

Two companies had sent in bids for the new outside power outlets that need to be installed at the library. AM Electric had the lowest bid of \$492.37 so they were awarded the job.

Two bids were received on replacing the south windows on the senior housing. The two companies had not used the same brand of windows in their bids so they will be asked to bid on the same brand and resubmit their bids.

The city clerk stated that the Alyrt Messaging System set up was completed. Mondamin residents can text MONDAMIN to 888-421-4458 to opt into the messaging service. This service will notify people about boil orders, water main breaks, utility notifications, and other disaster related events. You can opt out at any time by texting STOP. Other items that Alyx mentioned were the R & S client list, the final grant payment to the USDA, the FY25 audit, the levy amounts needed for insurance and payroll taxes, and communications with the IRS regarding 2017 payroll taxes.

Mike's Public Works report included that the new transducer was installed and is working great. The fire hydrant at the fire hall was repaired and is in working order. The electrical building at the lift station has been cleaned.

The next regular Mondamin City Council meeting will be April 6, 2026, at 7:00 p.m. in the city hall.

Use of Golf Carts Herald Spring's Arrival

With Mondamin's warm late winter temperatures with tulips and daffodils peeking out through the last snow, and

our thoughts are turning to spring, it's a good time for golf cart owners to be reminded about the city's rules regarding legal operation of golf carts so that everyone stays safe. According to the City of Mondamin's Code of Ordinances 3-3-69 developed in 2024 and based on Iowa Code handbook,

- "Golf carts may be operated on city streets by persons possessing a **VALID** driver's license provided that a special permit is obtained from the City Council."
- "The City Council may impose restrictions and conditions in addition to those set forth in the section."
- "Golf carts shall not be operated upon a city street which is a primary road extension, ie State or Federal highway (**Maple Street or Highway 127 in Mondamin**), but shall be allowed to cross a city street which is a primary road extension through the city."
- "The golf cart shall also display the house number of the operator and shall be operated only on the streets from sunrise to sunset."
- The golf cart shall be equipped with adequate brakes, a slow-moving vehicle sign, and a bicycle flag."
- See Chapter 321 or Code of Iowa for more information.

Operation of Off-Road Vehicles

Code 3-3-64

The operation of ATV or off-road vehicles shall comply with the following restrictions:

On any street within the City of Mondamin in accordance with Code of Iowa 321.I

- “Prohibited Operations: Shall not be operated on the sidewalks, railroad right-of-way, parks, or other City land.
- Time of Operation: Shall only be operated between sunrise and sunset.
- Compliance with State Code: All operations shall comply with Iowa Code Chapter 321.I. The use of any ATV/UTV within the City must first be registered with the proper State authority. The operator must carry the registration certificate whenever the ATV/UTV is in use. The State registration decal must be displayed on the ATV/UTV and remain clearly visible. All ATVs and UTVs operated within the City must have operational headlights, tail lights, brake lights, horn, brakes, muffler, and rearview mirrors.
- Speed Limits: ATVs and UTVs operating within the City must follow the posted traffic rules and speed limit signs, but not

exceed a maximum speed of 35 mph.

- An individual operating an ATV or UTV within the City must be at least 18 years old with a valid driver’s license and valid proof of insurance.”

All City of Mondamin ordinances are enforced by an agreement between the City and the Harrison County Sheriff’s Department.

WEST HARRISON'S TEAMMATES

Mentoring Coordinator

On March 22, 2026, West Harrison's chapter of TeamMates celebrated their 10th anniversary. Current and past mentors, board members, and current mentees celebrated with cake and ice cream.

After 10 successful years of mentoring 3rd-12th grade students, it is only fitting to look back to the beginning to find out how these past ten years happened. How did the idea formulate to have a TeamMates chapter at West Harrison? Who was responsible for the hard work necessary to start the chapter and keep it going?

In 1991 Nebraska's Coach Tom Osborne and his wife Nancy founded the group with the belief that positive relationships can change lives. TeamMates began with 22 Husker football players mentoring middle school students in Lincoln, NE. It started with a simple idea: every student

should have a consistent, caring adult in his or her life.

The TeamMates website adds, "TeamMates is a data driven program that finds that students' attendance and grades improve while disciplinary referrals are reduced if they have a mentor with TeamMates. The mission is to help students find their strengths and unique gifts and talents, and to positively impact the world by inspiring youth to reach their full potential through mentoring."

How did TeamMates get its start at West Harrison? A former guidance counselor, Olivia Puffer, heard about TeamMates from multiple sources, attended their conference, then contacted TeamMates to learn more about it and find out how to start a chapter. In July 2015, a representative from TeamMates came to West Harrison and held a meeting to explain what was needed to become an official chapter. The next step was for Ms. Puffer, some teachers, and community members to attend the monthly meeting of the West Harrison Board of Directors to ask the board to consider starting TeamMates. They agreed that a local chapter would be beneficial for our students.

At this point Kim Nunez was asked to help with coordinator duties. (Soon after this Ms. Puffer took a job at another school so Nunez took over the coordinator's job.) When asked about the process to start

the chapter, Nunez said, “It was a very involved process. We had to gather letters from businesses to show community support. A TeamMates board was created and in-depth training took place for the board members, as well as the program coordinator.”

TEAMMATES[™] MENTORING

When the group first started, a presentation was made to all 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders to get the word out to students. The request for mentors went out by word of mouth, trying to make matches with similar interests. Those matches were made and mentees and mentors were meeting by January 2016. That first year 23 West Harrison students had mentors. TeamMates is a school-based program so the meetings must take place at school. Both parties must be able to meet 30 minutes per week at school with a goal to meet 24 times a school year. Mentees and mentors can play a game, make a craft, or just talk to get to know each other.

Matching mentors and mentees starts by giving interested students an interest inventory. Nunez talks to the students to get a feel of who would make a good mentor for them. Each mentee has a one-on-one training with Mrs. Nunez to learn the guidelines of the program and directs them to a website to sign up. Some

mentee/mentor pairs have met each year until the mentee graduated.

The mentors register, have three references checked, and have a complete background check. They also receive training to learn what the guidelines are and what acceptable expectations are for meeting with mentees.

TeamMates has a board where the members rotate every three years. The current board members are Anthony Nunez, president; Jackie Fonley, vice president; Karen Breyfogle, secretary; Rochelle Michael, treasurer; and Jaime Martin-Cortes. They plan large group activities and fund raisers. Some activities from the past ten years include: attending a hockey game, bowling, attending a Creighton basketball game, attending the Nebraska Spring game, going to the Henry Doorly Zoo, attending recognition night where they are admitted to a sporting event free of charge and receive a food coupon for the concession stand, and going to an Escape Room. On April 7 they have plans to visit the Kiewit Luminarium in Omaha. Next year they will have more activities brought into our school with new events like possibly a BINGO night.

When Nunez was asked about what changes she has seen in the last ten years, she answered, “Over the past ten years, I think we are getting better at creating successful matches. I also think

we are doing better at communicating that this program isn't just for 'needy or at-risk students'. Every student can benefit from having a caring adult in their life. It is getting more difficult to find adults who are willing to commit to 30 minutes once a week to just meet with a student during the school year. We use the saying, just 'Be There'. Consistency is the key to successful matches. The mentor and the mentee need to show up to make the biggest impact."

Being a mentee for three years with TeamMates has benefits. Those mentees can apply for TeamMates Scholarships. In addition, members have the opportunity to take the Clifton Strengths Assessment free of charge.

Our senior mentees with their mentors will be attending a special recognition day at the Henry Doorly Zoo on April 22, 2026.

Seniors will be recognized at Seniors Honor Night before Baccalaureate and will be recognized with red and black honor cords at graduation.

TeamMates Mentoring Coordinator, Kim Nunez, completed her interview with these words: "Mentors are always needed! If you are unsure about mentoring, any of our TeamMates board members would be willing to answer questions. You can be any age (out of high school) to be a mentor. We will love to have any mentors ages 20-100 years old. Every person can make a difference in the

life of a young person and give them hope for the future."

Mondamin Memories

Time and Auto Catch Up with Early-day Peddler

Council Bluffs, Iowa

November 18, 1951

PISGAH—Time has caught up with A. J. Elias. He has padlocked the side doors on his narrow old wagon for the last time. He's looking forward to spending the winter in one place—on his farm south of here.

It wasn't always that way for the 74-year-old Elias.

For 55 years he was a country peddler. His customers were farmers living on rutted backroads between Council Bluffs and Omaha. Elias carried dry goods to their farms and sold them on the spot.

He was one of the first door-to-door salesmen in these parts.

On the Road Month At Time

"I used to go out the way I felt like," he remembers. "Sometimes it was a month at a time. Sometimes, two." But he's glad he won't be riding his 75-year-old wagon from farm-to-farm through another hard winter. "It doesn't pay to kill yourself," he says.

Elias estimates he had—at one time—nearly 100 customers on his dry good route. And his relations with them were unique, for a salesman. They were not only his customers; they were his hosts. He

stayed overnight in their homes and took his meals at their tables.

Didn't they charge?

"Gosh, yes, they charged me. Sometimes they would even invite me to stay all night—ask me—and then charge me in the morning."

The automobile killed business for Elias.

"There's no money in it anymore," he says candidly. "People go to town and buy now. I quit on account of I couldn't make a living."

The old horse-and-buggy peddler was emphatic on another point: "Don't go telling people that I made a lot of money, because I didn't. Just enough to get along."

And with one eye on a warm comfortable winter in his farm home, Elias is keeping a protective canvas on his old peddler's wagon—just in case the auto industry goes to pot.
